

Since we gathered in Canberra for last year's forum, a great deal has happened within the University Colleges Australia community. We will also be offering focus groups in the morning, which is an opportunity to pool our ideas and collaboratively solve problems our sector is facing.

My sincerest thanks to the Organising Committee for the hard work that made it possible. We hope that the experience they have facilitated is deeply enriching for you.

Dr Amanda Bell AM

Governance Intensive for Heads of Colleges



Amanda is a highly experienced leader, an accomplished non-executive director and strategic facilitator. Her successful portfolio career draws on specific expertise in education and governance.

Amanda's advisory work concentrates on strategic futures, leadership development and masterclasses for boards, CEOs and senior managers. Her work translates to opinion pieces and keynote addresses on current issues and new ideas impacting related sectors.

She holds a number of board directorships and is immediate past Principal of The Women's College within the University of Sydney. Amanda was appointed a Fellow of the Australian Institute of Company Directors (FAICD), the Australian College of Educators (FACE) and the Australian Institute of Management (FAIM).

Amanda was recognised in The Queen's Birthday 2017 Honours List as a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) for significant service to education, particularly to young women as a leader and academic, and to the visual arts.

Dr Liam Mayo

Governance Intensive for Heads of Colleges



Dr Liam Mayo is a sociologist who is intrigued by the ways in which notions of the future may or may not manifest themselves in cultural and social systems, as well as in the lived experience. This curiosity often leads Liam into investigations into how people's interpretation of the future influences the way they think, feel, and behave. His work is characterised by a strong accent on social and cultural theory, and is often thematically underpinned by storytelling, anticipation, and imagination. He is widely published and frequently invited to speak on these topics to corporate and community audiences alike.

Liam's PhD won an award for excellence from the International Association of Futurists and was the first piece of research to globally develop postnormal times theory. His work in this arena diagnoses and critiques the current significant societal shifts from the perspective of the future, so that leaders are best equipped to navigate change.

He is currently the course co-ordinator for Social Sciences and Humanities at the University of the Sunshine Coast, and an Adjunct Researcher with Radboud University in the Netherlands, where he is spearheading a project to build the institute's capacity and competency to incorporate futures thinking into its research and teaching. This work is interdisciplinary in nature, and as a research agenda is exploring how societal transformations are understood and enacted through the lenses of governance, justice, and leadership.



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Liam is passionate about growing leaders who not only understand how culture influences the way we think about the future but use culture to unify and drive successful teams. Alongside academia, Liam has had a successful international career leading executives and organisations through significant uncertainty. He has advised such organisations as the United Nations Human Rights Commission, the International Organisation for Migration, World Vision, as well as the Department of Immigration of Papua New Guinea and the Australian High Commission.

He is currently the Chief Executive Officer and Managing Director of Comlink Australia, an Australian not-for-profit that supports aging, vulnerable and disabled people to live independently in their homes.

Alice is the Director of Student Life at St Andrew's College. She is a committed educator within the residential college sector, having worked in education and colleges domestically and internationally for over a decade. Eleanor Spencer-Regan is Principal and CEO of Janet Clarke Hall at the University of Melbourne, the first residential college in Australia to accept women in 1886. She joined the JCH community in 2022, having been Vice-Principal and Senior Tutor of St Chad's College and Vice-Principal (Student Enrichment Directorate) at Durham University in the UK. Under her leadership, JCH has announced its ambition to become the first need-blind residential college in Australia, meeting 100% of demonstrated financial need for every applicant by 2035. Eleanor is an Honorary Senior Fellow in the School of Culture and Communication at the University of Melbourne and is a

former Frank Knox Memorial Fellow in the Department of English at Harvard University. Her research interests include twentieth and twenty-first century British and American poetry and children's and Young Adult fiction, and her publications include Family in Children's and Young Adult Literature (Routledge, 2023) and the New Casebook on American Poetry since 1945 (Palgrave Macmillan, 2016).

Uncle Mickey Kumatpi Marrutya O'Brien

Welcome to Country



Uncle Mickey Kumatpi Marrutya O'Brien, or Uncle Mickey, is a Senior Aboriginal Man – a descendant of the Kaurna (Adelaide Plains) and Narrunga (Yorke Peninsula) people and a passionate advocate for Aboriginal culture, language and history. He has been sharing cultural engagement for a number of years, and the role was handed to him by his father, Uncle Lewis Yarlu Purka O'Brien. It is a position he honours and respects greatly.

Uncle Mickey has travelled across Australia, living and working in a number of Aboriginal communities. He enjoys supporting the Aboriginal community, sitting on boards and Advisory panels. He is the recipient of the Rotary Club Courtesy Award for community involvement in working with youth, and an Australia Day Award recipient, for his work as a volunteer on advisory groups.

2024 and Beyond – What Does Residential College Sustainability Look Like?



Lee Constable is a science and sustainability presenter and edu-tainer. She is best known for hosting Network 10 kids' science TV show Scope. Her TV appearances also include Studio 10, ABC News Breakfast and War on Waste (Season Three). Lee is the author of How to Save the Whole Stinkin' Planet: A Garbological Adventure and How to Save the Whole Blinkin' Planet: A Renewable Energy Adventure.

Growing up on her family's sheep farm in rural New South Wales during severe drought inspired Lee to pursue her interest in science, climate and the environment in a Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Science (Honours). While studying a Masters of Science Communication she toured remote and regional Australia in the Questacon Science Circus, hosted a radio show on

2XXFM and SYN Nation, and founded Co-Lab: Science Meets Street Art. Lee's other adventures included guiding night-time spotlight tours of the National Botanic Gardens, giving tours of a landfill and recycling sorting facility and commentating robot battles.

In 2018 Lee embarked on an Antarctic journey as part of an all-women in STEM voyage. She used this experience to create *Antarctica: The Twitch-u-mentary –* an eight-hour livestreamed interactive edu-taining experience on her Twitch channel where she also talks science.

From spending evenings as an Education Ranger with a spotlight in hand showing school groups the plants and animals of the Australian National Botanic Gardens to spending days showing kids around ACT's landfill and recycling sorting facility, there's no environment too hot, cold, dark or smelly to warrant some youth-friendly scientific communication.

Lee regularly presents Instagram and Tiktok explainer videos for her own channels as well as other organisations and works as an MC and freelance science and sustainability communicator. In her spare time, she enjoys scuba diving and delivering science-y stand-up comedy routines as her Drag King alter ego Milton MANgo. Tackling Sector Challenges



Professor Jennie Shaw was appointed Deputy Vice-Chancellor and Vice-President (Academic) in August 2021.

Prior to her appointment as Deputy Vice-Chancellor and Vice-President (Academic), Jennie was the Executive Dean of the Faculty of Arts at The University of Adelaide where she oversaw the Schools of Humanities, Social Sciences and Education, the Elder Conservatorium of Music, several university research centres, and the University of Adelaide's node of the ARC Centre of Excellence in the History of Emotions.

Previous roles include that of Pro Vice-Chancellor and Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences at the University of New England, inaugural Director of Arts New England – UNE Centre for Research and Innovation in the Arts, and Associate Dean and Head of School at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music, University of Sydney.

Jennie has a BA Honours (First Class and Medal) and LLB (Honours First Class) from the University of Sydney and an MA and PhD from Stony Brook University. Her research and teaching interests cross the arts and humanities broadly, with a particular focus on the Second Viennese School and on creative practice as research. Recent publications include Music's Immanent Future: The Deleuzian Turn in Music Studies (Routledge 2016), edited by Sally Macarthur, Judy Lochhead and Jennie Shaw and the Cambridge Companion to Schoenberg, edited with Joseph Auner.

An active oboe and cor anglais performer, Jennie also currently sits on the advisory boards of the Helpmann Academy (SA) and the Australian Music Examinations Board (SA & NT). She is a Trustee of AMF (Australia), which provides scholarship funding for Australian music students to study overseas, and Deputy Chair of the federal AMEB board.

Rona is the founding CEO of Common Ground, a First Nations not-for-profit, and co-founder of First Nations Futures, focusing on wealth redistribution and economic justice. She has worked across the social sector, with an emphasis on First Nations policy and systems change, and serves as a non-executive board director and advisor.

Rona's been named in the Forbes 30 under 30 (2024) list, the Rising Star Alumni Award from the University of Melbourne (2022), and received a Westpac Social Change Fellowship (2020). She has also been recognized with the Bill Cowan Alumni Award from Trinity College, a Diana Award, and was a finalist for the Women's Weekly 'Woman of the Future'.
